



I am on Facebook, as are many of you. I enjoy looking at the words and pictures posted by my friends. I appreciate when people view my posts and react in some way—maybe a “thumbs up” or “heart” sticker. I take pleasure in knowing that I have been noticed, that people see me. For a brief moment, I count for something. What I think and how I feel seem to matter.

For me, those reactions are cathartic. Perhaps that is why I am so generous with my stickers. I especially like to leave one on a post for which there has been no others over many hours or days. I know how that feels, too. So, click . . . you did not write in vain . . . your thoughts were not lost to the wind. You matter, at least to me, in this moment. I see you.

I suspect many of you are the same way, and not just on social media. When talking with someone, isn’t it rewarding to know that the other person is really listening? You suspect that they are, given their facial expressions and gestures. Your suspicion is confirmed when they repeat or rephrase the things you say, and ask good questions along the way.

Active listeners are intentional about the way that they signal their reception and understanding. They let you know that they agree, or at least empathize with you, or at the very least have heard you. They get what you’re saying. They get you. They see you. We are justifiably annoyed when it becomes apparent that the other person is not listening, just biding their time.

During social gatherings at the college where I taught, the president sometimes approached me and inquired after myself or my family. Thinking the question was sincere, I would respond. But before I’d barely begun, he had moved on to another person. Not nice. Perhaps I have done that myself. These days I try to be more careful when others are speaking to me.

All this talk about being seen reminds me of a Bible story. In Genesis 16, a young woman named Hagar is despised by her master’s wife and made to flee into the wilderness. There she is alone and unwanted. Unseen. But God visits Hagar, and speaks with her. Then this: “She gave this name to the LORD who spoke to her: ‘You are the God who sees me’” (v. 13, Hebrew Elroi). Wow.

In the absence of a friend close by, there is One who sees you. I was reminded of this not so long ago while in a spiritual rough patch of sorts. I wallowed in some heavy disillusionment and doubt. In the midst of my wallowing, I spent a night at a cabin in the woods. Come morning, I was moved to turn and look out my window. Outside, a fox was picking its way through the trees, not far away. Quickly he was gone. In sending that fox, God spoke: I see you. What a gift.

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There is nothing quite like knowing that God has seen and spoken with you—through Scripture, an event, a trusted friend, perhaps an inward impression. In times like that we feel a special closeness to God. That is possible because, having once placed our faith in Christ, we began a relationship with God. Want closeness with God? Begin actively to listen for his voice. And call on him regularly. In fact, call him by name—Elroi. The God who sees you.

2025 November Financial Synopsis

November being a month of thanksgiving and counting our blessings has indeed proven true in terms of Offerings. Total Offerings for Nov 2025 were \$18,107 compared to monthly budgeted of \$17,610. However, monthly expenses of \$25.5k pushed the results of November into a deficit of \$7k.

Total Offerings to date were \$168.7k compared to 2024's \$198.3k. YTD deficit of \$7.2k for 2025 has brought the net position of the church to a negative \$30k.

Bank balance is still comfortable at \$39k. We must prepare to spend a little extra on BAN properties with approximately \$2.2k to drain the pipes and a few thousand on appraisals to prepare for the sale.

Pledges for 2025 as at end of Nov totaled 28 pledges for \$98,482. A comparison of these 3 year's pledges are:

Although each individual giving unit may be giving more or less than the average calculated pledge amount, the total pledges for 2026 show an increased average for which we are thankful. We continue to pray for faithful giving to support God's work.

Comparison of prior years' results are as follows (dollars rounded to nearest \$100):

Endowments

Endowment balances were \$512k in October and increased to \$514.5k at end of Nov 2025. At the beginning of 2025 we had \$508,630 in Endowments from which \$66,400 was withdrawn throughout the year for \$64k for General Fund and \$2,400 for mission payment to Miguel Angel Asturias School in Guatemala. Instead of ending November with \$442,300 balance in Endowments, we have \$514.5k! The stock market increase of 12% over the same period plus contributions of \$5k to the Endowment funds certainly assisted in this gain, praise God.

Bank balance is comfortable at \$39k and net unrestricted fund balance stands at negative \$30k. November's deficit of \$7k contributed to increasing the net deficit for the year.

E-Expenses were higher in November due to the payment of pass-through missions amounting to \$3.3k and \$2.4k for appraiser services. E-giving YTD totaled \$5,561.03, a decrease from 2024's YTD of \$10,496.20 and 2023's \$7,858.01.
